11. All specimens should be displayed in clear glass containers and have the exact number of stems or blooms posted.

12. Superintendents reserve the right to dispose of any specimens showing severe wilting, spoilage or damage.

GENERAL RULES AND POLICIES

1. The FFA exhibit will be governed and controlled under the general rules and regulations pertaining to the fair, such as health and sanitation, entries and other which apply in general.

2. Exhibits shown in FFA must be owned by the exhibitors, either in individual or in partnership.

3. Livestock shown can be either registered or high grade stock, but must be of pure breeding. Market classes may be crossbreds.

4. Entries are open only to those members of FFA in Martin County. A member may show if they are a current dues-paying member and have not surpassed the 4th National FFA convention after graduation.

5. An exhibitor may show two entries in one lot (livestock only) but only one first prize will be awarded in each lot. One entry will be allowed in group lots.

6. The entry fee per class shall be \$2.00 per class for cattle and horses per class, \$1.00 per head for swine and sheep and \$0.50 for poultry and rabbits. There will be an \$10.00 per head bedding charge for beef cattle if not dual shown in a 4-H class. Goats are \$0.50

7. In case of illness, a member may substitute another member to show his entry with the approval of the department superintendent.

- 8. Breeding animals for beef, dairy, sheep and swine must be owned by the exhibitor by June 1 of the current fair year.
- 9. Market animals must be owned and fed for at least 60 days.
- 10. The judge shall decide the merit of each entry and make all awards.
- 11. All FFA entries should be given to your FFA advisor by August 1st.
- 12. FFA horse exhibitors are not required but encouraged to wear a

helmet. A minimum of a short sleeve shirt, jeans, and boots are required.
